




Our welcome to you and your child is warm, and please remember we are always willing to talk to parents at any mutually agreed time.




Aims of the School







Ffederasiwn Dwy Afon

Llangedwyn School is part of a 2-school federation with Llanfechain School, sharing an executive headteacher. Both schools retain their distinctive characteristics, but also share a vision, faith and learning opportunities. The schools meet at least once a month for federation activities, which give pupils the benefit of additional learning experiences and opportunities and the chance to widen their circle of friends. In addition, the schools share school trips and gain from the advantages of being part of a bigger organisation.

Admissions Policy

In Powys, children may enter full time education in the academic year in which they reach their fifth birthday.

Prospective parents are invited to contact the school to arrange a visit during school hours, not only to see the Headteacher and staff, but also to sample the learning atmosphere of the school.


Where schools are oversubscribed, the LEA has adopted, in order of priority, the following criteria when allocating places:

- the presence of an elder brother/sister in the school (where the home remains in the catchment area of the school which applied in the year the elder child was first admitted)
- the location of the home in relation to the school and alternative schools
- any special medical and social needs relating to the individual child
- the presence of a brother/sister at the school when the family home is NOT in the original or current catchment area for the school

Teaching Organisation

Reception, Year 1 and Year 2

Foundation Phase

Principles

Pupils are taught by 'stage not age' therefore what is being taught is always appropriate for them. The principle we teach by is that young children learn most effectively when they are playing (in accordance with Welsh Assembly Government Guidance). Children learn by building on their own experiences and they use these to make sense of the world around them.

Areas of Learning

There are 7 areas of the curriculum we need to cover:


- Personal, Social and Cultural Development and Well-Being
- Communication, Language and Literacy (English) (Literacy Framework)
- Mathematical Development (Maths) (Numeracy Framework)
- Knowledge and Understanding of the World (Science, History, Geography)
- Physical Development (PE also fine motor skills, e.g. cutting out, threading)
- Creative Development (Art, Music, Dance)
- Welsh Language Development.

Approach

The classroom is arranged into 'curriculum areas'. Pupils access the areas freely as continuous provision. They have an understanding of the equipment available in each area and how it can be used. This provision is then enhanced on rotation, allowing for more focused learning opportunities. These specific challenges are differentiated depending on the pupil's learning needs. In addition, there are 'focused' group tasks that the pupils complete with an adult that are appropriate for their stage of development. During the day there are short, planned periods of numeracy and literacy to ensure all pupils acquire their key skills for learning. All pupils are encouraged to use Welsh phrases throughout the school day. They have daily Welsh tasks and a Welsh lesson each week. Each half term we investigate and explore a different topic. These topics are designed to bring in all areas of the curriculum. The pupils initially explore what they know about the topic, discuss what they want to know and write question that informs the teacher's planning. In this way, the pupils direct their own learning and build on what they already know.

Assessment

Children's development and progress is recorded throughout the year. We assess in terms of the Learning Outcomes laid down in the curriculum. At the end of the Foundation Phase the Welsh Assembly Government would expect most pupils to be at Outcome 5.



Key Stage 2

Principles

Within the key stage 2 classroom, pupils from Y3 to Y6 are provided with a broad and balanced curriculum which is differentiated to meet the needs of all. All pupils learn through experiences which build on previous learning, whilst supporting, extending and challenging them to meet their potential.

Curriculum

The pupils learn through an evolving creative curriculum which covers the following national curriculum subjects:

- English (Literacy)
- Maths (Numeracy)
- Information Communication Technology and Digital Literacy
- Science
- Welsh as a second language
- Religious Education
- Physical Education
- History
- Geography
- Art
- Design Technology
- Music

Approach

We aim to give all our pupils equal access to a broad, balanced, relevant learning curriculum that includes all aspects of the National Curriculum. A range of teaching and learning approaches are used as appropriate and we recognise that learning is a continuous process and children acquire knowledge at varying speeds.

Pupil voice is an essential part of the pupils' learning experience. They are encouraged to choose topics to study, ask questions and then answer them, and design their own learning tasks. Pupils are encouraged to be active learners at all times, discussing their work with peers, challenging and supporting each other. They are taught to reflect on their own and others learning and identify strengths and ways to improve. We believe that pupils should be taught good learning habits and use growth mindset and metacognition strategies to support this. The focus on the pupils as learners, as well as the learning, develops pupil independence and a love of learning that they take with them when they leave the school.



At Llangedwyn, we develop cross curriculum themes chosen by the pupils, which start with them and their local area, and relate this to the wider world. This gives the pupils a strong sense of community and belonging, and a pride in where they come from.

Cross Curricular Skills

At Llangedwyn we use give our pupils opportunities to develop and independently apply their cross curricular skills of literacy, numeracy and digital competence. We believe that authentic learning experiences and 'real life' problems allow pupils to apply these skills and deepen their understanding.

Assessment

All pupils' development and progress is recorded throughout the year. We assess in terms of the subject levels laid down in the National Curriculum. At the end of Key Stage 2 the Welsh Assembly Government would expect most pupils to be at Level 4. We also assess pupil wellbeing through the PASS assessment and value emotional and social development, as well as academic achievement. Pupil progress through their time in our school is monitored carefully, and each pupil is encouraged to develop their own learning pathways, rather than being compared to others. An essential element of our assessment arrangements is to ensure all learners understand how they are performing and what they need to do next. This results in independence and lifelong learning.

National Tests

During the first half of the summer term all pupils from Y2 to Y6 take part in national tests set by the Welsh Assembly Government in reading, maths and problem solving.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

At Llangedwyn Church in Wales School, Religious Education is provided in accordance with the Powys Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education. Collective worship is a central focus of our school day. Collective Worship takes place daily at 9.15am and the pupils are given the opportunity to listen, reflect and participate in religious stories, topics that relate to faith and 'real life' sing hymns, praise, celebrate achievement and say prayers. Reverend Peter Heaney and Darren Mayer (Impact Bus) visit the school regularly and contribute to worship. Pupils from Llangedwyn School join those at Llanfechain School for an act of collective worship each month.



It is our aim to help children in their social, spiritual and moral development to enrich their own lives and in turn the ethos of our school. We will encourage pupils to understand how and why people worship, and endeavour to increase their awareness of other religions and cultures, whilst maintaining the strong Christian ethos of the school.

The pupils visit the local church and take part in a variety of services and activities linked to Christianity with the school.

Parents have the right to withdraw their children from the RE lessons on grounds of conscience or belief and this can be arranged through the Headteacher.


Curriculum Change: A Curriculum for Wales (2022)

In Wales, the approach to developing young people aged 3 to 16 is changing. The new curriculum will have more emphasis on equipping young people for life. It will build their ability to learn new skills and apply their subject knowledge more positively and creatively. As the world changes, they will be more able to adapt positively.

The purpose of the new curriculum is to support our children and young people to be:

- **ambitious, capable learners**, ready to learn throughout their lives
- **enterprising, creative contributors**, ready to play a full part in life and work
- **ethical, informed citizens** of Wales and the world
- **healthy, confident individuals**, ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.

As a school, Llangedwyn is planning and changing its approaches to develop good practice through the new curriculum. As this happens, the pupils will have new opportunities and experiences to develop and enhance their learning and enable them to become lifelong independent learners.



School Organisation

School Uniform

We have a school uniform that we actively encourage our pupils to wear. Our school colour is red with our school logo displayed. School uniform can be ordered through the school office.

School uniform consists of a red sweatshirt or hoodie, red polo shirt or t-shirt, dark trousers or skirt and shoes. Due to the adventure playground, we are flexible with trousers and shoes, however jogging bottoms are not suitable as uniform.

We encourage all pupils to keep a PE kit in school consisting of trainers, jogging bottoms or shorts, t-shirt and warm jumper.

Care of Property

Please note that the LEA or the school does not accept responsibility for personal property and will only compensate for loss or damage when the LEA is in some way to blame. The LEA is not responsible for property left overnight on the school premises.

Attendance


When a child is absent, a parent needs to inform the school on the first morning; either by phone or in person. Absence which cannot be reasonably explained will be reported as unauthorised. In 2018-19 the school's attendance was 92.83%, of this 0.29% were unauthorised.

Contact Details

It is necessary for us to know where a parent or guardian may be contacted in an emergency, or for us to know of another person you have authorised us to contact e.g. grandparent or neighbour. These details are kept on an Emergency Contact Form which should be kept up to date at all times.

School Meals

All pupils stay at school during lunchtime and supervision is provided for all. School meals are brought from Llanrhaeadr Ym Mochnant Primary School kitchen and served in the hall. The children can have a hot meal or jacket potato. The cost of school dinners is £2.45 a day. Dinner money is paid through the Parent Pay website.



Snacks

Pupils bring their own snack each day. We are a healthy school and we encourage the pupils to bring fruit in for their morning snack.

Breakfast Club and Kids (After School) Club

Since September 2005 we have run a successful Kids Club, which enables us to provide safe provision for working parents' children from 7.50am every morning and until 5.00pm on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and 4.30pm on a Friday.

The Breakfast Club is £1.50 per day between 7.50am and 8.20am and £1 per day between 8.20am and 8.45am, this includes a subsidy by the Welsh Government.

The Kids Club is managed by an independent committee. Children follow structured and enjoyable activities ranging from crafts to games.

The Kids Club is charged at £5 for the first hour and £1 for every subsequent half hour.

Transport


If you live more than 2 miles away (measured by the shortest walking distance) you may be entitled to free transport to and from the nearest school. For further details and an application form, please see the Information Sheet in the LEA Admission Pack.

Secondary School Transfer

In the final year of primary school, pupils' parents are able to decide which secondary school they would prefer their children to attend. Llangedwyn is part of the Llanfyllin High School catchment area. If you have any concerns about your child's transfer do not hesitate to talk to a member of staff.

School Trips

Children enjoy visiting places and learn much from first-hand experiences. We have a programme of educational visits linked to different areas of the curriculum, including both day and residential visits and visiting workshops. We are not allowed to charge directly, but will request a voluntary contribution. Children are not excluded from school activities if parents are unable to pay, but parents are requested to notify the Headteacher if problems arise, so that alternative arrangements can be made.



Facilities

The school has toilets appropriate for children, adults and disabled persons.

Disabilities

As a school we recognise the importance of understanding and respecting all people. Our school makes appropriate arrangements for the admission and access of disabled pupils. We ensure that disabled pupils are not treated less favourably than other pupils. Our school access plan and our disability equality policy are available on request.

Illness

If your child is ill, please keep him/her at home. It is important that you let us know that they will not be attending school. Please notify us between 8:15am – 9:15am on that day. If a doctor has prescribed your child medicine, we may be able to administer it in school. This will need to be discussed, initially with a member of staff and the appropriate forms completed.

Pastoral Care


The pastoral care of the pupils is the responsibility of the class teacher. However, as a small school, all staff take a major role in the guidance of pupils. The school aims to enhance all children's self-esteem through encouragement and support. A strong family atmosphere is fostered where pupils care for each other and older children are encouraged to develop a caring attitude towards the youngest pupils.

Behaviour

As a school, we place considerable importance on high standards of personal behaviour. These standards of behaviour are normally reached through encouragement and praise. The pupils themselves create their class rules and discuss any issues at the regular Senedd meetings. Differences in opinion, or misunderstandings, are dealt with fairly and openly, using a reciprocal approach. This allows all pupils to share their own perspective of what has happened and gain an understanding of others' perspectives. Pupils are encouraged to collaborate to find solutions to the problems they experience.

Bullying

Every opportunity is taken to ensure that an anti-bullying approach is built into every aspect of school life. Bullying is not tolerated in school and children are encouraged to tell their parents or teachers if they are unhappy for any reason. If you have any concerns, please contact the school immediately.



Child Protection

At Llangedwyn School we have a pastoral responsibility and duty of care towards our pupils. An important part of this aspect of the school role involves the prevention of abuse and neglect. We comply with the "All Wales Child Protection Procedures". In circumstances where abuse or neglect are suspected, the school will implement procedures. This may involve the sharing of information with other agencies and professionals as appropriate. Our member of staff responsible for the promotion of the educational achievement of Looked After Children (LAC) is Catherine Hart and our governor with responsibility is Debi Storey. The Child Protection Policy is available for all parents to read.

Supporting Learning at Home


We believe the work of the school is greatly enhanced when parents share and support the children's learning. In foundation phase, we ask that parents read with and to their children regularly, as this has major benefits in acquiring and developing reading skills. In Key Stage 2, pupils are encouraged to take their reading books home every night to read with parents and develop a personal love of reading. In addition, they have access to maths practice games such as TT Rock Stars, which allow them to develop confidence in mental maths. When appropriate, pupils are set project-based homework, or encouraged to follow up schoolwork at home.

Special Needs

The Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator (ALNCO) at our school is Catherine Hart. The ALNCO, in collaboration with the Governors and Headteacher, plays a key role in helping to determine the strategic development of the ALN Policy. Dick Row is our ALN Governor. Pupils with additional learning needs generally benefit from working within their class but may be withdrawn individually or in small groups for focused work.

Sex/Relationship Education

Sex/Relationship education is an important aspect of our PSE (Personal Social Education) curriculum for all children. Year 5 and 6 pupils benefit from discussions with the school nurse and watching a related video. Parents will be informed before this lesson and have the right to withdraw their children.



Welsh Language and Culture

We want our children to understand and be proud of their own culture, language and heritage. Welsh is taught as a second language with an emphasis on conversational development in preparation for secondary school. Incidental Welsh is encouraged throughout the school day. Pupils are given regular opportunities to practise and develop their Welsh language skills around the school and through Welsh lessons. We benefit from very good support through our peripatetic Welsh teacher, Mrs Andrew. The school has recently been awarded the Cymraeg Campus Bronze Award. We take our key stage 2 pupils to Cardiff to experience an urban environment and learn about our Welsh heritage. This includes visits to the Senedd and the Principality Stadium.

Sports & Healthy Living


The school promotes the importance of healthy living throughout the school day. This includes choosing appropriate snacks and meals; living an active life through daily exercise like Llangedwyn Legs and playtime activities; and taking part in local sports events and competitions, for example tag rugby, football, rounders and area sports. In addition, key stage 2 pupils have the opportunity to take part in our outward bound residential at Conover Hall each year.

Pupil Groups and Senedd

At Llangedwyn School, we believe pupil voice is an essential part of school life. All pupils are encouraged to be part of school committees and so make decisions about the running of the school. We believe this enriches their experiences at school, prepares them for leadership in adult life and allows the school to flourish. We currently have the following committees:

- **Senedd** – formally the school council. It makes decisions about the day-to-day running of the school. Members of the Senedd are also on other committees and feedback and coordinate the work of the committees across the school.
- **Ecoschools** – environmental awareness
- **Criw Clic** – promotion of digital skills and support of equipment
- **Criw Cymraeg** – promotion of Welsh language and culture
- **Worship Committee** – developing opportunities for reflection and expression of faith throughout the school day.
- **Healthy Schools** – raising awareness of healthy choices and their impact
- **School Development Group** – pupil involvement in the strategic development of the school.

These groups meet regularly each week. Pupils aim to take an active role in school decisions by ensuring pupils' views and needs are given high priority and all pupils are actively involved in solving problems and improving their school. Many of the committees have been involved in



achieving nationally accredited awards such as Healthy Schools level 4, Eco Schools Bronze Award and the Cymraeg Campus Bronze Award.

Equal Opportunities

Llangedwyn Church in Wales Primary School promotes equality in all aspects of school life. We believe that people must be educated to be able to live together in a mixed society respecting the value of all as individuals in their own right.

The school promotes equal opportunities and good relationships by:


- Treating everyone as an individual and with equal concern
- Giving every child an equal chance to learn and develop
- Taking into account each pupil's age and stage of development, gender, ethnicity, home language and any disability
- Encouraging each pupil to develop a sense of their own identity and culture
- Helping children learn about cultures different from their own and to develop positive attitudes towards people who are different from themselves

Community

The school has strong village connections resulting in generations of local families attending over the years. This together with close links with the church ensures that the school life is embedded in the community and vice versa.

At Llangedwyn Church in Wales Primary School we enjoy excellent links between ourselves and the local community. We believe that the partnership which exists between home, school, Church and the wider community is crucial to children's learning.

Over the year the school supports a number of charities including; Children in Need, Macmillan Coffee Morning, Hope House Hospice, Red Nose Day, Show Racism the Red Card and Jeans for Genes.



Parent Teacher and Friends Association

The School is very well supported by our PTFA who meet regularly and raise invaluable funds that support the purchase of new equipment and fund trips and coaches for the pupils. The PTFA meet regularly each half term and organise a wide range of social functions for the school and wider community, as well as fund raising activities.




